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#### Most Important aspect of Rotary Club

In Rotary Clubs, continuity is indeed an important aspect of their leadership structure. The positions you mentioned Immediate Past President, Current President, and President-Elect - play vital roles in maintaining this continuity. Here's a brief overview of these roles in Rotary Chandigarh Midtown or for any Rotary Club;

**Immediate Past President** (IPP): This is the person who served as the club's President in the previous Rotary year (July to June). The Immediate Past President acts as a mentor and advisor to the current President, offering guidance based on his/her experience. They also often serve on the club's board of directors and play a role in club leadership, and ensure harmony and smooth functioning of the club.

Current President: The President is the current leader of Rotary Club. They are the responsible for presiding over providing club meetings, direction for club activities, and representing the club in the broader Rotary organization. The President serves a one-year term, after which they become the Immediate Past President.

**President-Elect** (PE): The President-Elect is the Presidentin-waiting. This person is usually elected to the position about a year before they take on the role of President. During this time, they work closely with the current President and the club's leadership to prepare for their upcoming term. This allows for a smooth transition and ensures that the club's activities and initiatives remain consistent from one year to the next.

The continuity maintained through these positions helps Rotary Clubs maintain a sense of tradition and effective leadership as each President transitions through these roles, building on the work of their predecessors and preparing their successors. This structure contributes to the long-term success and impact of Rotary Clubs in their local communities and around the world.

This reinforces the importance of the leadership structure within Rotary Clubs, as previously mentioned, where the Immediate Past President (IPP - Rotary year 2022-23) Rtn Dr. Sanjay Kalra serves as a mentor and advisor to the Current President (Rotary vear 2023-24), Rtn Jeeten Bhambri, and ensures that all is well in the club. The President-Elect (PE), Rtn Nitin Kapur prepares to take on the role of President in the next Rotary year (2024-25). It's through this continuity that is practiced by Rotary Chandigarh Midtown and other Clubs which can effectively carry out their service projects and other activities for contribution to their communities.

While discussing about Immediate Past President, Current President and President Elect, the role of past presidents of Rotary clubs varies, but they often continue to play an active role in their Rotary clubs and their local communities. Some of the key roles and responsibilities that past presidents of Rotary clubs should undertake are Mentorship and Leadership in supporting the club's mission of advancing peace, goodwill and community service.

Some past presidents may choose to become involved at the district or international level of Rotary, serving in leadership positions or participating in Rotary programs beyond the club level.

It's important to note that the level of involvement and the specific roles taken on by past presidents can vary widely depending on the individual, the club's needs, and the opportunities available within the Rotary organization.

The role of a past president is often one of ongoing service and leadership within the Rotary community.
