Project Sakha - Under its flagship project Sakha, Team Rotary Club Chandigarh Midtown distributed nutrition packets to the registered patients of Tuberculosis at Halomajra. Miss Mamta from the Chandigarh health department coordinated the program. Dr. Manjushri Sharma, Director Community Services, along with Dr. Nitish Sharma, interacted with the patients and took an update about their treatment progress. It was nice to see many old patients recovering with the help of supplements provided to them. The nutrition packets for this month were sponsored by Rotarian Dr. Anurag Sharma, We are very thankful to our fellow Rotarians who have come forward and supported this Project with full heart.

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Scholarship Program for Under-privileged Girls - RCCM

Our scholarship programme for under-privileged girls was the brainchild of PP Lakshmi Khanna of RC Milano Sud-Est, Italy, and it began in the year 2008. While visiting our club Lakshmi suggested a collaboration between his club and ours. As per offer individual donors from Milano would commit \$1000 each donor each year toward tuition of girl students, and RC Midtown would contribute 25% of the total cost. With this blueprint we moved into this most productive and long lasting programme which is still continuing 14 years later.

PROJECT OUTLINE

This project was to benefit girls from under-privileged families wanting to study engineering. The objective was to help them complete their course and find employment at very good salaries in India. We concentrate on second rung colleges because that is where you will come across students from the EWS class. If we divide engineering colleges into five grades with IITs being at the top and private colleges with indifferent facilities at the bottom then UIET, Chandigarh falls in grade 3 alongside Regional Engineering colleges. The tuition fees at UIET are 90,000 annually.

Students who get admission here are normally ranked at 40,000 to 125,000 in the JEE (joint entrance examination). Rank determines the course that a student is going to get. Board and lodging takes the expenses to around 2 lakhs pa. Most of the kids belong to middle and lower middle class families. For obvious reasons their access to top schools and top coaching institutes is limited therefore they rank lower in the JEE. We select students based on their economic background as determined by Family income, support from relatives, access to bank loans or government scholarships. The ones with the minimal access to these means are our target. Our programme commits to pay 2/3 rd of the tuition fee . This is paid twice a year at the beginning of each semester and is directly related to academic performance.

In the last fourteen years we have had two students whose support was stopped because of poor performance. At the end of the course the placement programme ensures that these students get placed in mainly second rung IT companies or at the second rung in top IT companies. Starting salary is normally around five lakh rupees.

One of our earliest recipients with seven years of work experience is now getting almost 30 lakhs. Another has just been promoted to Executive Engineer. One or two are abroad. Several are happily married, and for the first time in their life comfortable. Most are employed and receive handsome salaries. At least half of these girls are from single parent families where the father has either died or abandoned the family. Yet each of these girls and their families have overcome unimaginable hurdles in completing the course. It is most satisfying that today one girl is adding two rooms to her family's one room house. Another girl is guiding and helping her younger brother in his college studies. Two of them are thinking of shifting to work for banks. Afew have paid the entire cost of their own weddings as well as those of siblings. And so their world moves on.

Over the years with this focus in mind all three clubs have supported about 40 girls in various disciplines though our main focus has been on girls studying for an engineering degree. Occasionally we have supported girls studying Arts, Literature and even Business. We have during the course of these fourteen years also supported two boys on compassionate considerations. Over 14 years it is estimated that the club has given out about 40 lakh rupees to these students. At-least half of this amount has come from our international partners RC Milano Sud-Est and RC Lugano, Switzerland. The rest of the contributions have come from very generous individual donors. This project has been successful because club members have been amazingly supportive. Equally fulsome support was forthcoming from friends of Rotary, for this most worthwhile cause.

Selection Criteria:

Usually Three Rotarians comprise of the selection panel. for the year 2023 Rtn. Arjan Singh, PP Rtn. Ritu Singal & Rtn. Dr. Manjushri Sharma were on the panel for selection. As the students selected are in Engineering studies the criteria are their financial needs. The panel does cross questioning with candidates about their family financials and then conclude on dispersal of funds. The decisions taken are always collective.

Current Beneficiaries : In the year 2023 Two girls were selected while Four girls were selected in 2022. Each Scholar is given Rs. 80000/- per year, being 65% of the Tuition fees at UIET (University Institute of Engg & Technology). The current six students are in the 1st Year (Two Students) and 2nd Year (Four Students) - Suman Kumari (UIET), Diksha Gupta (UIET), Disha Rani (UIET), Priyanka (UIET), Ritika Mankotia (UIET) & Tanuja Ranjan (UIET)

Having been associated with this our ongoing project since inception , We personally find it an extremely satisfying journey where one sees tangible results at the end of four years of study. Those associated with the project have also found it very gratifying as have others who have followed it from a distance.

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Very Interesting Paradox – Desk of Rtn. Dr. Balram Gupta

Very interesting Paradox

Many years ago, a Law teacher came across a student who was willing to learn but was unable to pay the fees. The student struck a deal saying, "I will pay your fee the day I win my first case in the court". Teacher agreed and proceeded with the law course. When the course was finished and teacher started pestering the student to pay up the fee, the student reminded him of the deal and pushed days.

Fed up with this, the teacher decided to sue the student in the court of law and both of them decided to argue for themselves. The teacher put forward his argument saying: "If I win this case, as per the court of law, the student has to pay me as the case is about his non-payment of dues. And if I lose the case, the student will still pay me because he would have won his first case...So either way I will get the money". Equally brilliant, the student argued back saying: "If I win the case, as per the court of law, I don't have to pay anything to the teacher as the case is about my non-payment of dues. And if I lose the case, I don't have to pay him because I haven't won my first case yet....So either way, I am not going to pay the teacher anything". This is one of the greatest paradoxes ever recorded.

Who is right and who is the winner?

This is part of ancient Greek history. The lawyer teacher was Protagoras (c.485-415 BCE) and the student was Euthalos. This is known as Protagoras's Paradox. This case was not solved. The most interesting part - this is still debated (even today) in law schools as a logic problem !..

Hands across the Globe

Clean rivers are central to life UN environment body looks to Rotary's reach to protect freshwater ecosystems By Diana Schoberg

Salvador Rico's childhood memories are intertwined with the Ameca River near Buenavista in Jalisco, Mexico. Recollections of his siblings swimming in its waters are juxtaposed with the tragic loss of his sister, Agueda, to polio in the 1960s. The family attributed her illness to the sewage-tainted river where she had swum. Witnessing his mother's anguish over Agueda's death left a lasting impression on Rico. He made a solemn vow to himself to make a difference.

Rico found an avenue to fulfill his promise when he joined the Rotary Club of South Ukiah, California, in 2007. Inspired by a cleanup initiative along the Russian River, Rico envisioned similar efforts in Mexico. Partnering with Rotary members in Mexico, Rico spearheaded a comprehensive plan to tackle water pollution, starting with the Ameca River. This initiative, fueled by Rotary's community influence, led to impactful cleanups and advocacy efforts, significantly improving water quality in the region.

Eunice Kamau, from the Rotaract Club of Naivasha, Kenya, echoes the sentiment of safeguarding vital water bodies. Her involvement in a Lake Naivasha cleanup underscores the critical role of community action in preserving freshwater ecosystems.

Recognizing the potential of Rotary's global network, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) has forged a strategic partnership with Rotary for the Community Action for Fresh Water initiative. This collaboration aims to empower Rotary, Rotaract, and Interact clubs worldwide to adopt water bodies for conservation, supported by UNEP's expertise and resources.

The initiative encompasses various levels of engagement, from basic cleanup activities to advanced monitoring and advocacy efforts. By leveraging Rotary's grassroots presence and UNEP's environmental expertise, the partnership seeks to address pressing challenges such as climate change, habitat loss, and pollution threatening freshwater systems.

UNEP emphasizes the significance of community involvement in safeguarding ecosystems, aligning with Rotary's ethos of service. Gavin Reynolds, an expert with UNEP's freshwater ecosystems unit, highlights Rotary's global reach and action-focused engagement as invaluable assets for achieving meaningful impact.

Rotary's longstanding collaboration with the United Nations reflects its commitment to global initiatives. The adopt-a-river concept, conceived by Joe Otin during his tenure as Rotary's representative to UNEP, serves as a blueprint for community-driven environmental stewardship.

In Kenya, the pilot initiative focused on rehabilitating polluted rivers drew inspiration from successful conservation efforts, such as the transformation of the River Thames in England. By collecting data through citizen science initiatives, Rotary clubs contribute to a global repository informing policymakers and donors about freshwater ecosystem health.

Salvador Rico's tireless efforts exemplify Rotary's dedication to environmental sustain-ability. His advocacy spans continents, rallying Rotary clubs worldwide to combat water pollution and restore ecosystems. From the Ameca River in Mexico to the Motagua River in Guatemala and Honduras, Rico's mission reflects a promise kept—a testament to Rotary's enduring impact on communities and the environment.


