Dr. Rita is a graduate in medical science from Medical College, Indore. She is now doing MBA in Health Care Services from Mahipal University. She is a keen social worker for the past 20 years. She is also an integral part of our medical camps. She is married to Dr. Sanjay Kalra, Principal, BRS Dental College, who is also running a Dental Care Multi-Speciality hospital in Panchkula. 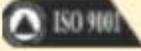

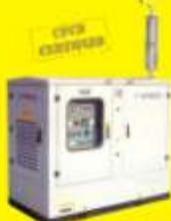

Polio in India is now on the verge of being eradicated because of generous donors who gave regularly. They still do. How can the habit of giving be cultivated among Rotarians? Simple. Let them interact frequently with habitual donors to The Rotary Foundation. The Club leaders and District leaders have to provide for such opportunities. Those who have the habit of donating every year to TRF have what is called as the 'habit memory.' It is very organised and rigid. The forums in which this habit can be cultivated include PETS, DTTS, District Assembly, TRF Seminars, Installations, Project visits, Alumni meetings and regular communication with the members in the clubs.

Indian Rotarians in Africa for Mega Medical Project

RI District 3132 and RI District 3080 are embarking on a mega medical mission to Africa, with a thirty member strong team lead by District Governor Rtn. Madhukar Malhotra of RI District 3080 and District Governor Rtn. Shirish Rayate of RI District 3132, providing free surgical treatment to more than 1300 poor patients of Zambia and Malawi of RI District 9210 from 8th April to 21st April 2011. This team, comprising of 21 doctors and 9 Rotarians as volunteers, is serving beyond borders, to embrace humanity across Continents.

In 1997, Past R.I. President Raja Saboo, the then District Governor Rtn. Dr. Rajiv Pradhan of R.I. District 3130, Late Rtn. Nandlal Parekh of USA and Rtn. Dr. Madhav Borate initiated a project of doing Polio corrective and eye surgeries in Uganda. In those days it was unique for an Indian Rotary District to sponsor and physically execute a project abroad. This project was done in 1998, which was a great success.

Indian Rotary districts have now done many medicare projects in Africa in countries like Uganda, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Tanzania,

So far more than 100000 patients have been examined and 26800 surgeries have been performed. The cost benefit extended to Africa is well above Rs. 35 crores. More than 300 doctors and Rotarians have participated in these projects. Many Rotarian doctors and volunteers have visited Africa several times. This has greatly enhanced the image of Rotary and India in the African states, and world wide!

PRIP Raja Saboo and Usha ji have always joined as volunteers (by bearing all the costs) and provided yeoman service to the poor patients. They are again part of the above team and under their stewardship we are proud to enhance the Rotary image of India!

This is a matching grant project financially supported by both the above districts and districts in USA and Italy.
